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Foreword

My great-grandfather John O'Connor left Ireland probably in 1877, and was killed by a bolting horse near Riversdale, New Zealand in 1896. My Aunt Margaret Walsh told me recently that contact with Ireland was lost after the first generation left, because of illiteracy; however, after the visit to Ireland during the First World War of her mother cousin, Isaac O'Connor,¹ her mother Catherine O'Connor Nicholl continued to write to cousins in Ireland, and as shown below, this correspondence continued right up to Catherine Nicholl's death in 1970.

Over the years since 1877—and despite the illiteracy of that first emigrant generation—the links back to Ireland have been kept alive: first by New Zealand soldiers on leave from the Western Front; by correspondence between first cousins during the Thirties; by my mother's visit to Ireland in 1950, the resulting correspondence that continued for the next 50+ years, and the support to Fr Mark Connolly during his missionary years in Africa; by my sisters' and my visits in 1984/1987; my parents' further visits in 1985 and 1991; and most recently by my own family's visit in 2019.

In October 2019, when I visited cousin Mike Connolly in Welwyn Garden City, I promised him that I would make an edition of the letters his mother and others had sent from Ireland to New Zealand over preceding decades. Mike had told me that he did not know of anyone in Ireland who had any old letters from New Zealand, but this project had been in my mind for some time, as a way of thanking our Irish relatives for their hospitality, and as a way of strengthening the family bonds that have been kept up over the years.

My mother Elizabeth Nicholl visited Limerick in December 1950 after her Holy Year Pilgrimage, with Mary Walsh (later Sister Mary Justin), as her travelling companion. Mum continued to correspond with relatives in Ireland and the United Kingdom until her death in 2013. Most of letters presented here were gathered together at home (6 City Road, Dunedin) in successive archiving efforts from 1982 to 1993, and again after Mum's death in 2013. From 1987, when I left Dunedin, there was no active separation of letters from Ireland into separate files, and therefore there are likely to be many more letters written during this period that have not yet been found; they will be scattered through my parents' personal correspondence for those years. The letters are now part of the Papers of John and Elizabeth O'Neill, preserved in the Hocken Library in Dunedin, New Zealand.

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I originally had Margaret's uncle Morgan visiting Ireland during the First World War, but have since been reminded that Morgan did not make it to Ireland before he was killed in action: Morgan's letters home from the front mention his desire to visit Ireland, but state that leave to Ireland had been cancelled in February 2018; Morgan was killed on 20 April 1918. [Correction made on 26 August 2021.]

To fulfill this project, Rebecca O'Neill photographed the folders of Irish material at the Hocken Library in December 2019. During January 2020, with Canberra enveloped in bushfire smoke, my son Joseph and I shared the transcription effort.

On a visit to New Zealand in March 2020, I found more letters in the boxes at the Hocken Library, and also gathered a few additional items from cousin Pauline Herron, mostly letters from Fr Mark Connolly to Sister Mary Justin. These latest additions are not yet transcribed. I also scanned Mum's photos taken in Ireland and England in 1950, and these photos are now most of the illustrations.

There matters might have rested for quite some time, while other priorities prevailed. It would take quite some time to work through this collection, editing, dating, footnoting.

However, I have been prompted into action by two messages forwarded to me by Kathleen Doczy, of Chicago, in which Nora Ghauri commented firstly on my December 2019 preview edition, and secondly on a photo I had recently distributed that was taken by my mother in Limerick in 1950:

Thank you for sending me the O'Neill family connection, it was lovely and touching to read especially since I knew him when I was young. Paddy and Molly [Flavin] were nice people. His sister Mary McEvoy was also a lovely neighbour and our next-door neighbour. It's good to know that the letters were kept and are now in the family history for all to see.

Thanks for the Glenagragra connections with Flavin and Mike Long's photo. That is how I remember Mike riding his bike before he left for the USA. It's lovely to see how the photo is still making connections around the world today and bringing back memories. I was a bit too young to remember the girls visiting Flavin's. There were quite a few young men in the neighbourhood who would have taken interest in the girls.

So I have decided to release this unfinished edition pronto. Who knows which of us will still be around long enough for a perfected edition? I hope there are some amongst you now on coronavirus lockdown who will have the time to enjoy reading this collection. 
Figure 4 The O'Connor family at Kingston Crossing, Southland, New Zealand, 1909

Part 1: Nell O'Connor, 1919


Isaac (Ike) O'Connor was gassed (a second time) on the front lines in France on 30 September 1917, and was admitted to the No. 2 New Zealand General Hospital at Walton-on-Thames on 12 October 1917, and transferred to the NZ Convalescent Hospital at Hornchurch near London on 25 October. From 23 November, he was on leave, with instructions to report to the No. 3 NZ General Hospital at Codford, near Salisbury, by 10 December 1917.¹ This was probably when Isaac made one of his visits to Ireland, as there is no other period of leave marked in his military service file. His daughter, Carole Perwick, however, thinks that Ike visited Ireland three or four times.









There were two Catherine O'Connors at this time who were first cousins, one the daughter of John O'Connor and mother of Elizabeth O'Neill, the other the daughter of Mick O'Connor. However, the final greeting to family confirms that this card is addressed to Elizabeth O'Neill's mother, whose wartime letters to her soldier brother and cousins are also preserved.

Part 1: Nell O'Connor

29/10/1919

Dear Cousin

I trust you and my relations are first class. Is cousin Dominic home? Tell him write to me as I would love to hear always from him. How is Cousin Ike making out? The poor fellow must be delighted to be back in the dear old home. He was often telling us about your good nature, how often you would write to him during the awful war. Tell him when he has rested & is himself once more to write to us. Tell Ike Paddy Flavahan got a young daughter since he left.³ He will be sorry to hear his wife is not well, she is in hospital. I am sending you some news papers, they will let you know how things are going on here.

All your relations here wishes to be remembered to you and all the family circle. Remember me to your Mother, Brother & Sister.

Goodbye, Dear Cousin, God bless you.




Had a letter from cousin Kathie, she was telling me you were home.





Dear Mum

For the last 2 nights Mary & I have slept in the bed where Grandmother used to sleep. We arrived in Dublin on Wed morning & I received a letter from Cousin Paddy, so we wrote & said we'd come over on Sat. We received a lot of mail in Dublin but haven't had time to answer any of it. We had a good look around Dublin in the 3 days we were there & the night before we left we were at John Lockhart's brother's place. They want us to call there on the way going back but we'll only have an hour between trains so I don't know how we'll manage. Taxis are pretty expensive, but I think they want to send a record over for John so I'd like to get it.


We got to Limerick at 1.30pm but had to wait for a bus to Glin at 6.15—we arrived at Glin at 8 & were met by Mr & Mrs Flavin & Mick. We called at some second cousin or other for a cup of tea & came the 7 miles here by car,²⁶ which seemingly was hired for the occasion. At home there are John, Pat, Mick & Jim, they work round about if they can get it. There are two sons married, one in England—while the girl, Jose, works for an uncle whose wife is dead.²⁷ Sat night they said we'd be going to Mass with an ass but we went by car, and passed endless horse & cart, bikes & people walking to Mass—3 miles from here to Athea.²⁸ Uncle Paddy & John & Jim play the violin. Last night we went to the dance about a mile from here with Jim & Mick again in the car. It was a great dance & we were doing sets we'd never seen before & there were twice as many boys as girls. It wasn't like Balfour, the dancing kept going non stop, & the chaps were



very friendly. On the way home we passed lots biking home, 1.30 a.m. Minnie McEvoy²⁹ lives just up the road from here & we're going up there today—Katie works for some relation & we're told will be at McEvoys today also. Two of the McEvoys, Maureen & Joan, were here yesterday. The people here are very hard to understand—shure they're Irish—we had bags of fun at the dance trying to know what they were talking about. There was a George Lynch here—I think a cousin of Cissie—last night & we're to go there for dinner tomorrow. There's a thatch roof here & the fire is a big turf one on the floor & the big pot hangs over it & the bread & all is cooked on it. In other words I imagine the place isn't a scrap changed since grandmother left. Your family group is hanging in the bedroom. Uncle Paddy is a hard shot & not unlike Dominic etc. You could write to him & send some photos & some of the O'Connors—they'd be pleased to hear from you. Cheerio for now & Merry Xmas to all. Love from Elizabeth

Minnie McEvoy (1890–1963), Paddy Flavin's sister. In a letter to her parents from London on 3 November 1950, Elizabeth wrote, "By the way I didn't get a reply from Aunt Minnie." This explains how Paddy Flavin came to write to Dublin urging Elizabeth Nicholl and Mary Walsh to come to Limerick—Elizabeth had written to Paddy's sister Minnie.

Dear John,

Time has flown since I last wrote to you, in fact you'd be surprised what a busy life this life of leisure is. The last few days we were in Scotland there were about 6" snow on the ground. There had been hard frosts too & there was an inch of ice on the road. It was pretty though, fun too. I had my first experience of sliding down the side of a hill through the snow on a sledge over the moor with 10 yr old Peter. Joseph was a golf "fiend" & we'd hoped to take a lesson from him but the snow prevented it.

Our crossing from Glasgow to Dublin was excellent. It was just getting dark as we left & we saw the lights of the ships as we went up the Clyde.

We arrived at our destination in Clontarf

It cost me 7/- to send her a telegram just to say "No" as we won't have arrived at Auckland on 27th. Fair go, I can't imagine what further arrangement she will make for me. 


Figure 8 Mick Long of Glenagragra in Athea, Limerick, December 1950




Figure 9 "A picnic in Eire." "This was taken at home three years ago."


11. Elizabeth Nicholl to her mother Catherine, 19 December 1950






12. Elizabeth Nicholl to her fiancé John O'Neill, 21 December 1950








Figure 10 Kathleen O'Connor with Moss and Delia Reidy, Limerick, 21 September 1987



Figure 11 Kathleen O'Connor and her sister Madeline Kennelly, Shanagolden, Limerick, 21 September 1987





Figure 12 Teresa and James Kelly and children Elizabeth, Maureen, Geraldine and John at the 1890s O'Connor home, Ballyguiltenane, 22 September 1987

They have 7 children, five married, and I think a dozen grandchildren. She just wrote the other day and said they plan to go June/July.

Sister Mary Justin is in Australia now so I'm sure they will be visiting her on the way.

Today Mary left New Zealand for 9 weeks in the Chatham Islands, 3 hours flying from N.Z. an isolated place, but the Sisters run the Hospital there. She is pleased as she likes quiet places and it will be a real change.

Are you living in the same house as when we visited you, and is Jim Flavin in the same place? One of his daughters writes to Therese from Cork I think. Therese is working 400 miles away from here in Blenheim as a journalist for a newspaper. She did 18 months in the newsroom of the local radio station before that. She will be home for Xmas and then (after we have visitors from Wellington) we will go to her place as we've never been there before. She has 2 small bedrooms, and there are 10 of us, and Joe and Carolyn and the grandchildren Greg and Chris intend coming too so I think we'll need a tent or two.

Michael was admitted to the bar on Friday/and Patrick was capped p.m. B.A. He is going to Holy Cross Seminary at Mosgiel, 20 minutes drive from here on 11 February.

Would you please give me directions for Margaret to follow in Ireland? John didn't manage to find you. What families are still round about and what would be the nearest town for them to go to? I think Justin's firm will be arranging the tour. Margaret's address is No 4 R.D. Gore, N. .Z. By the way do you have the telephone on? If so, what number and exchange.

Kathleen I trust all is well with you. We've had a really hard year - on issues. John even wrote to all the Bishops in Ireland and writes also to Father Paul Marx who will be visiting you now. In March John and I and Rita and a few other handicapped had a hearing with a Petitions Committee in Parliament and the work has continued throughout the year without much sign of results. Please pray for its success.

John is still working as an orderly at the public hospital (geriatric wards). Joe and Mike are at the office. Paul has done one year at law. There's to be a reunion of our Hospital early next year; we had a dinner recently at the home of one of my friends for the matron who is retiring. Tonight I learned that one of our girls who became a Catholic, but later dropped it when she married, lost her husband last night, just died in his sleep.

We've been involved in getting Catholics United for the Faith started here; Jim Likoudis from US has been over twice and it has been developing since the visit of English Dr Jack Dominian last year. We tried to stop his visit as his book Proposals for a New Sexual Ethic opposes Catholic teaching. We got no support from the Bishops, and religious flocked to hear him. There was also a lot of controversy in the church about the Springbok tour last year, even though there was a black Catholic in the touring team.

Part 4: Phine Connolly

Elizabeth Nicholl visited Phine and Tom Connolly on 20 December 1950 (see Letter 12), the day before she sailed from London's Tilbury Dock on the return trip to New Zealand. Elizabeth and Phine continued to correspond until Phine died in 1995. Elizabeth's son John F. O'Neill visited the Connollys in 1977, as did I in 1987. Elizabeth and John O'Neill visited Welwyn Garden City again in 1985 and possibly also in 1991. John O'Neill's 1985 travel diary for that day reads as follows:

25/6/85. Going out to Phine's but all messing about in London first. Japan Airlines were good. We arranged (after finding them) for confirmation of our 17-hour flight to Tokyo on 28/8. Also arranged Hotel round corner from terminal. We will probably go by train to Nagasaki. Had a further try about the money but no go. Finally we got out to Phine's and walked to her place from the station. We were determined not to take a taxi. Boot's Chemist lady had a map. We met an Australian lady on the train. Elderly pensioners like her cannot stay in England; are not on reciprocal pension. USA has millions over the retirement age. It wasn't a long walk—nice gardens, etc. Phine and Tom were at home. Tom has a terrific vege garden. Young Tommie and 3 of his kids (came from South of England—also Michael and his wife and 4 children). We had a lovely tea then they found Fr. Mark had arrived home from Germany. Tommie decided to drive us to his place and then Fr. Mark could drive us back to London. We went round to Michael's (just round the road and saw Fhahteshurt's[?] house (not his personal house but one on the estate) preserved as historic Edwardian place. Cricket being played on back field—light to about 9:30pm. Rain. Tommy drove us about 50 miles and then Fr. Mark took us back to London. We said Rosary in the car and talked of going together to Walsingham. We were home about 11:20pm. Also called past Mary's and met her husband.



Her six children were born between 1943 and 1957.


She started nursing at the Queen Elizabeth ll Hospital soon after its opening in September 1963 and she retired from that work in 1984.



Part 5: Fr Mark Connolly

Phine Connolly's eldest son Mark was ordained a Holy Ghost Father (now Spiritans) in 1968, and went to Nigeria soon after as a Catholic missionary. Elizabeth and John O'Neill sent donations and letters to Father Mark, as did Elizabeth's 1950 travel companion Sister Mary Justin. Father Mark visited New Zealand in 2003, and between 2004 and 2011 he worked in the diocese of Broome and Port Hedland, in Western Australia. As elsewhere, there are long gaps in the series of letters here, and more letters have probably been preserved that have not yet been found. Father Mark has given his permission for these letters to be included here.

Dear Elizabeth,

Looking at the postmark of your letter and today's date there seems to be a big lapse of time for which I sincerely apologize. It is unfair not to acknowledge your letter and gift immediately. I hope you will forgive me.

I don't think you can imagine my delight when I received your gift. At the time Father and myself were wondering how we could pay for the mason's bill on the Church roof. God always provides. So your gift has gone to the roof of our Church. It will take some time to finish yet because we can only move as money becomes available, but when it is finished it will be a grand Church. We have to organize the whole building programme ourselves. One has to supervise all the time and this takes up a great deal of time. We also have just completed a Maternity and are starting another one at the end of this year we hope.

I have offered up three Masses for the intentions you asked for and I shall continue to remember them in my prayers. Please God by now your tenth child will be in the world. I hope everything went well.

We have rather a big area to cover in this parish, covering about 1600 sq. miles with 80 stations of one size and another. Sometimes we might be able to get to a station once a year which is not a good thing. If another 40 priests were put into this diocese we would be just about able to do the work we should be doing without making any rapid advances. What makes the whole situation worse is that the war has just ended and it is taking time for life to get on the move again.

I cannot say that I have settled down at all.

It makes time a long time. There are so many things which are strange, particularly the people. Their language is very hard and I must admit I have made no progress at all.

We are very busy at the moment trying to straighten out things. Father is going away next week for 3 months leave so I will be by myself.

My sincerest thanks once again for your generosity. Please remember our work in your prayers. My regards to all your family.

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


I have only been out here six months but I feel as strange as the day I first arrived. So are so many things one has to get used to. The people, the climate, the type of work.it will take me many years to feel I am making some headway.

By the time I am writing these few lines the Bishop has left after spending two days here. I must sya that he is very easy to get on with, but looking after a diocese this size with only 30 priests calls for a great deal of resourcefulness.

We are now in the middle of the rainy season which cuts down our ability to work considerably. There are no such things as tarred roads out here, consequently it is very hard to travel with the roads with 3–9 ft of mud. I hope you will excuse me if I do not use up the rest of this letter form. Time prevents me from writing any more as there are a thousand and one things I must do before the sun goes down.

My sincere thanks once again for your kindness and generosity. If by any chance you do want me to say more Masses for you, the Bishop was telling me that the best way to transfer money is to have it credited to the account of the Diocese of Mahur at Barclays D.C.O. Bank, Northumberland Ave, London.

In Phine Connolly's letter dated 29 August 1970, she says that 'I was so glad to hear your mam got Mark's letter before she died.'





Dear John,

Many thanks for your unexpected but most welcome letter. I must say your letter was very informative and now I have a very good idea of what a young man like yourself does in New Zealand.

I suppose you would be very interested to hear about life and my work here in Nigeria. I must confess that I am not a great letter writer and everyone complains that I do not give very good accounts in my letters. I have only been in this country for six months and I have still not settled down in spite of the fact that I am already temporarily in charge of a mission.

It is a very big mission covering approx. 1600 sq miles. We have about 85 stations some of them with up to 400 church members in them so you can imagine there is plenty of work to do.


We try to visit them as often as possible but this often means only twice a year. Since there are very few roads we have to trek from one station to another and the school children carry my loads on their heads, sometimes for distances up to six miles. You would be surprised to see children about 3 or 4 years old carrying big buckets of water on their heads.

The roads out here are very bad. No such things as tarred roads. And you can imagine what they are like during the rainy season which we have now. Trying to get a car through 2 to 3 ft of mud.

We are also in the process of building a new church and a maternity and dispensary building. We have already completed one and I started on the foundations of the second one last week. It will cost £1500 to complete.

You asked about food. One cannot eat all the food that the Africans have. We have to try and get hold of European chop but sometimes this is very difficult. But I must confess that there is always something around so that I never have to starve.

I am glad you were able to find Oturkpo on the map. Adoka is about 24 miles N.W. of Oturkpo. At one time

the war front was only about 50 miles away from here but the Federal

troops were very quick in moving south. It was a good day when the war

ended. People are now able to settle down again and try to improve their

conditions.


My apologies for not replying to your letter bef[ore ...]. It has been a mad rush for the past [...] months and even now it still continues tho [ugh ...] have managed to slip away from the mission [...] another place for two days to answer in [coming] mail.


The postmark on this letter obviously indicates that I am home on leave, and unfortunately there is no typewriter at hand so I am forced to write in this bad handwriting of mine.

I left Nigeria last Friday and spent two days in Spain before reaching home. On the way through Makurdi the Vicar General informed me that your transfers (Two) had reached London. I could never express sufficiently my deep thanks for your gift. On the way home I was going to ask the Vicar General to lend me money to send back to the Mission to pay the masons for the Churches I have built so far. Your gift avoided a rather embarrassing situation for me and means that I can make plans to carry on building when I return without having to repay a debt.

I don't know whether I told you before but I was moved to another Mission before Easter. This one is on the border of the Eastern Region about 17 miles from Nsukka so that will help you to pinpoint it on a map. (Address is Rev. M. Connolly, St Edwards Parish, Aiodu-ORUKPA via Obollo-Afor P.A. Nsukka, East Central State.)

The problems are much the same as the other parishes, trying to build up the Christian Community, and also assist in various social and community development projects particularly medical ones. Unfortunately we are so short of priests that the Mission is vacant for the three months that I am away.

So far for the few days that I have been home I have spent a lot of the time sleeping. Next week I shall start to stir myself a bit more.



All the family are very well which helps to make the leave all the more enjoyable.


Dear Elizabeth

Many thanks for your very newsy letter which arrived at the beginning of the year. You obviously enjoy writing letters and find it very easy to write with great enthusiasm what most people take to be the mundane in life. You were obviously enjoying your holiday at Alexandria, the change I am sure doing a power of good, especially being able to have so many of the family with you. But by the time this reaches you the holiday will be very much a happy memory. I was pleased to hear the family are doing so well despite the lack of opportunities which the world of recession seems to have created. You did not mention Mary in your letter. I hope she is able to adjust to her new way of life without too much difficulty. We shall continue to remember her in our prayer.

The anti-abortion campaign in this country seems to have lost some of its momentum. Part of this is due to a certain amount of tension between two groups, "Life" & "The Society for the Protection of the Unborn Child". I sometimes feel that overt campaigns that societies such as those I have mentioned and other similar ones, tend to polarise opinion because of the directness of their method. And unfortunately in doing that, they make a greater percentage of the apathetic and uncommitted more favourable to the Abortion Lobby than to the "Anti-Abortion" Lobby. We have to use the same weapons to overcome this evil that these 'Liberals' use to create such a favourable climate, namely to influence public opinion by "popular" presentations, on the stage, T.V., Films, glossy magazines, Radio, Newspapers etc. we are not creating an "intellectual", "articulate" elite among our young people who can fulfil

this role. The Church for the most part is alienating them. Only when you have tackled that fundamental problem, will you have the power and facility to tackle the evils of materialism, seen especially in Abortion, Euthanasia, Injustice, Poverty etc.

I did read the book "Blessings" by Mary Craig. She is the kind of person that I was alluding to above, someone who has discovered real faith and will talk about her faith publicly without making a direct public



campaign. There are one or two others like her who have gone into

journalism and are replacing the 'agony' column writers of the 60's who

have done so much harm.

This looks as if it may be the year for me to move back to the Missions. I

have been approached with a view to returning to the northern part of

Nigeria, which is dominated by Muslims and opening a mission in which

there has been very little Catholic Missionary activity. I am fearful and

yet excited at the prospect. Please pray that everything goes well.

Obviously I do not know the precise disabilities that Rita suffers from,

and each case from a pastoral point of view has to be treated separately,

but in my experience there are very few cases where it is utterly

impossible to give some sort of preparation for the Sacrament with the

help of experienced [...] teachers and "Faith-full" parents. I shall pray for







Dear Magaret; This letter must start off with a massive apology, Your letter has been on the desk in my bedroom since it arrived in early March. Soon after receiving it I travelled to Europe on business for the Diocese and I was away until just after Easter. On my return there was such an accumulation of work that it has taken me up to now to try and come to grips with it and as yet I am still at sixes and sevens. I have also had to take up residence in another community which means that my personal loads are still in boxes until new furniture can be made. So that is the reason for the delay. But I suppose one could always make time if we really tried. The work that I do as Development Co-ordinator for the Diocese entails a great deal of travelling within Nigeria as well as abroad and I am regularly travelling to Kaduna, It is nearly 900 kilometres from here but I have to go every six to eight weeks for metings. I will be there in three weeks time but unfortunately you have only given a box number for Donald and it would mean writing to him first. With the post so bad in the country I don't think that there would be a reply in time. Was his stay to be a short stay or for a long period? You mention in your letter that you correspond with Auntie Kit in Ireland, Do I take it that you are part of the extended clan? Kit is great for keeping up the contacts with everyone dispersed over the world, Even though in this work which I have been doing on a full time basis for the past two and a half years I travel regularly to England I have not had the same opportunity to stay with my parents and make good visits to all the family in Ireland, When I was working in the parishes we were eligible for a three month break every twenty one months which gave an adequate opportunity to spend some time with everyone. Now I just hit them in spots which is very unsatisfying. However I have promised my parents faithfully that I will spend a full month with them in October. We shall drive over to Ireland and visit all the folks. They are really looking forward to it. It seems by the accounts in your letter that many of your family are in the Religious life and some are missionaries as well, I often think that we missionaries are a dying race, A few years ago there were many preaching the doctrine that there was no need to evangelise in another country, God will look after his own. There is enough to do in our own western society. Now that thinking has gone but there are very few vocations to the missionary orders, Still all the work is in his hands,







THE EXTENT OF THE MINISTRY & PARISH

It is now two months since I left the UK on my journey back to the Kimberley. With the passing of Easter I have found that I've been thrown in at the deep end, learning fairly quickly what is required of me here in Wyndham. I cannot say that I have settled and feel completely confident about my place here. However in the past two months I have had a chance to meet many of the people of Wyndham, especially those who are Catholic and I have set up a schedule of visits to five of the six "remote" communities where there are Catholics who are to come under my care. In addition I have to give priestly ministry to the large community at Warmun 210 Kms from here which is ministered to by a Sister of St Joseph and a Pastoral Centre which is also under the care of the same community of Sisters. For the moment they have Mass only

once a fortnight on a Monday evening. That will give you an idea of how luxurious it is for the people at home to still have a choice of Mass on Sundays as well as in many cases daily Mass.

EASTER WEEK

In anticipation of the celebration of Holy Week and Easter the only thing I could be sure of in Wyndham was that I would not be inundated with great crowds. At the best of times I can only count on a core group of ten white and three aboriginal adults to be at Mass every Sunday with a transient group of another ten to fifteen. But there are a number who come to Mass very occasionally. Being a holiday occasion made it all the more possible that some of the groups would be absent at that time. Despite all this at 6.00 pm on the evenings of Palm Sunday, Holy Tuesday, Holy Thursday, Good Friday and Holy Saturday I arranged for services following or adapted from the Church's Liturgy and on each occasion a small but faithful group joined me in worship and celebration of God in his Passion, Death and Resurrection of Christ. Next year I am sure few more will join us and we will be able to experience a greater sense of community in the sacramental presence of Word and Life in Wyndham.

What gives me hope for this is that on Holy Thursday morning in our primary school the children dramatised the Gospel stories of Palm Sunday, Holy Thursday, Good Friday, and Easter Sunday. These dramas were interspersed with prayers which I led. This activity drew many more of the adult population of Wyndham (parents of the children) who thus were experiencing the Word of God through the children. The presentation of the Resurrection by the Kindergarten and Pre-Primary children was particularly effective. We are blessed with a dedicated

Catholic Principal ably assisted by good catholic teachers and teaching assistants.

However difficult it is in the UK to show people the significance and beauty of the Church's liturgy in Holy Week and Easter, it is ten times more difficult in the Kimberley. We had to contend with a two day fishing festival with prizes amounting to over \$A10,000: a clear choice between God and Mammon. But I am thankful for the presence of the faithful few who helped to make my first Easter in the Kimberley meaningful and memorable.

DIOCESAN MEETING

Because of the vastness of our Diocese and the long distances between the nine parishes in the Diocese, the blessing of the oils and the gathering of the priests, traditionally held on Holy Thursday took place in our Diocese the week before Holy week. Three separate meetings were held simultaneously; the Principals of the 14 Catholic Schools, the Pastoral Associates from the parishes and the priests of the Diocese. On matters of mutual interest the three groups came together to talk and to share about their common interests. Two days for travelling the outward and return journeys totalling 2100 kms. and three days for meeting and prayers while informative and energizing nevertheless left me feeling very tired.

HOLY GHOST FATHERS

The Holy Ghost Father in Australia are a relatively small group of coming from Ireland, East Africa, Nigeria, England and one Australian of Maltese extraction. We are scattered over this vast country and come together once a year to assess our mission and give support to each other in our Spiritan vocation. This year the meeting is in Perth so this requires

another long journey the week after Easter week. Another week away from Wyndham so soon after coming here does not give a good signal to the people of the parish.

RICHARD

After that my nephew Richard is coming to stay a couple of months with me. I'm looking forward to his visit; someone to have as a companion and share some of the exploration of this area to which I am assigned but are still very unfamiliar with.

WARMUM

While presiding at liturgy and prayer in Wyndham I also had the top preside at the liturgies of the Catholic Community at Warmun, 210 Kms. from Wyndham. This vast area of the Kimberly is sparsely populated. Of the 33,000 people in the area only a third live in six small towns including Wyndham. The remainder live in small self serving aboriginal communities with populations ranging from 50 to 500. Warmun is one of the larger ones and the inhabitants are Kija people who made camp at a place called Turkey Creek when they were banished from the cattle stations. On being granted citizen's rights in 1967. (There is a great paradox in that). Eventually the Government did a lot to help these communities set themselves up by providing water resources, 24 hour locally generated electrical power, telephone, basic health care facilities and schools. The Kija people in Warmun insisted with the Government that the "Sisters" run their school so there is a strong Catholic identity in the Warmun community. This was reflected in the liturgies of Holy Week which drew strongly on rituals of their own culture and would have given a Roman liturgist a heart attack if he were joining in with the community. The people themselves have incorporated gestures and

symbols from their own culture and "law" portraying the Passion, Death and Resurrection of Christ and to celebrate it within the context of their own lives. The return journey 420 Kms three times in Holy Week though tiring was well worth the trouble. To be able to celebrate our faith with these people who are daily living the Death and Resurrection of Christ in their daily lives in a way that I have not experienced before was a great privilege.

THE WAY IT IS

On Easter Sunday we had the news that another young 16 year old had committed suicide during the night. There have been five such deaths in the 15-25 age group in the past year; a phenomenon of aboriginal people in both North America and Australia. It has to be more than just the clash between traditional societies confronting the prevailing drug and alcohol abuse. Rather a deeper seated inability for traditional societies to cope with the shallowness of the twentieth century culture and society.

MOVING ON

Now that the Easter period with its journeys to Broome and Perth either side of the celebration of Holy week are behind me I am now ready to face another phase of my induction and familiarisation to the pastoral ministry of Wyndham and Warmun.

It has started off badly with a ruined gear box the repairs of which are estimated to cost in excess of £Stg1,200. Parts have to be flown from Perth and shortage of skilled mechanics account for the extremely high expense. Finding this money and finding alternative transport for the next two to three weeks that the garage will have to have the vehicle for is a problem that I have to face with the help of the Bishop.

I hope this set back does not frustrate the plan that I have for the next few months to get to know where the Catholics are in the eight isolated Aboriginal communities which are in the territory entrusted to my care. They are far flung, the furthest being 330 Kms from Wyndham. How I will go about this I'm not sure. I need someone to introduce me to all those who call themselves Catholics. Even when you call at a house or make arrangements to visit that may have gone "walk about" or they are so engaged in their own form of "socialisation" that to intrude would be insensitive and even counterproductive. It is something I will have to persevere with and not be disillusioned with the slow response. Personally I find it difficult to "cold call" on houses. So I will find this approach to reinforcing the presence of Christ uncomfortable and a strain.

One of the questions that was put to me in the meeting of the Holy Ghost Fathers in Perth was "Am I in for the long haul?" This question has been asked of me many times since I returned in February. Clearly this question is posed because of the experience of the indigenous living in remote areas who see so many "professionals" i.e. teachers, nurses, social workers come with a sense of commitment and dedication to work for a special usually short period and then move on. This undermines the continuity of service and mitigates against any trust and good will that is essential if the indigenous people of the Kimberley are to be helped come to grips with the reality of their identity in an economic, political, social and cultural milieu which has yet to completely respect their existence and identity and at the same time give them the spiritual and practical support that will allow them to adapt and find their place in "modern" Australia. I would hope that I would be one of those people who can stay with them for as long as my health and my superiors allow

so that I become a visible sign of the Church's commitment to Aboriginal people in their difficult period of transition in terms of social and cultural adaptation.

CYCLONE

Just before Easter the northern coast of the East Kimberley experienced one of its worst cyclones, rated category 5 which is the highest rating. It was named Ingrid. The eye of the cyclone passed directly over the mission in Kalumburu 150 miles North West of Wyndham and the winds of 250 KPH destroyed one third of the mission buildings. As well as being a financial blow it is also a loss in historical terms because Kalumburu is the second oldest catholic mission in the area, established by Spanish Benedictines Monks in 1909. The buildings that were lost were architecturally significant but did not conform to modern cycl[on]e resistant building standards. Wyndham was on "red" alert for 72 hours. The children and old people were evacuated to the hospital which had been built to cyclone standards. The edge of the cyclone passed to the north of Wyndham resulting in winds here of 160 KPH being recorded at Wyndham. Cyclone Ingrid dropped 12" of rain in 24 hours, 50% more that our normal monthly total for February and March.only one tree fell in our church compound causing slight damage to the wall of the church. So that is another bill that we have to face up to. The good news is that with modern meteorological techniques much more accuracy can be attained in assessing the direction and the impact of a cyclone and a state of readiness can be brought into play. In the passage of Ingrid across Northern Queensland, Northern Territories, The Kimberley and the Torres Strait Islands while there was extensive property damage there was no loss of life.

WARMUM COMMUNITY

When Kija people, who were the original land owners of parts of East Kimberley, were forced to leave the pastoral stations which had been established by the colonizers, they set up camp on the Great Northern Highway at the Road House, Turkey Creek. They gathered there in the late 60's and early 70's where they build the bough dwellings out of leaves and branches and wandered far and wide to search for "bush tucker" on which could survive. Bush tucker consists of roots, leaves, and berries that are nutritious and animals such as kangaroos, goanna and snakes which provide meat. The pastoralists tried to stop the foraging for food because they felt that the aboriginal people would kill some of their cattle (which they sometimes did) and eventually the government intervened and helped these Kija people establish a more permanent community, building houses for families, providing electricity, water and community store from which they could buy their food from the welfare money they had been given or the money that they earned when they were able to find some work.

At the heart of aboriginal life and culture is the "Law", the initiation and the living out of the culture and traditions which animated community life and relationships. When the Government came to provide a school for the Kija people at the camp that was named Warmun the people insisted that the Josephite Sisters establish and managed the school on behalf of the community. In agreement with the Sisters the education of ther children was took be a partnership of the Sisters experienced in the teaching of religion and western secular educations principles and the elders of the community who would contribute to the traditional, cultural, social education of the young people. This partnership worked well for 20 years and is only now beginning to break down as the elders

involved with the inauguration of the project now die away and younger people move away from the traditional values and practices of the Kija people.

Much of the deterioration comes as a result of the abuse of alcohol and drugs and a welfare system that has created a dependency mentality.


On my last visit to the Warmun community the Sisters managing the school in the community were explaining to me the difficulties that they were trying to cope with on a day to day basis; the very poor attendance of the children at school reinforced by the indifference of some of the parents; finding teaching staff that are prepared to adapt their teaching style and techniques to aboriginal culture and needs; the child neglect and child abuse that results from alcohol and drug abuse that is increasingly pervading the community. The stories illustrating these difficulties abounded and at the end of the evening everyone was quite depressed and wondering whether there had been any progress at all in the 20 years since the community first established the Catholic School.


We had evidence that it had the next day. A 15 seater twin engine aeroplane landed at the nearby airstrip. This plane had been sent from Darwin by the Government to collect 13 secondary school students from the community who attend St John's College in Darwin. They had been home on holiday for Easter and it was more economic to send the plane for the 13 than issue vouchers for the Greyhound bus fare which would take them 14 hours to cover the 1200 kilometres to Darwin. Five years ago they were happy to have had two from the community continue with their secondary education. Now they can fill a plane and there were others still on holiday in the community who were going back to schools in Perth, Sydney and Geraldton. So instead of dropping out of schooling altogether there are increasing numbers persevering with their

secondary education and the government does everything possible to ensure that they have all they need in the boarding hostels that are provided and see that they can keep regular and frequent contact with their families back in the communities.

When the pilot had landed his empty plane we expressed surprise that he had done so. The strip is normally used for smaller single engine planes and we wondered if he would be able to take off with his load. He was a little apprehensive himself. With baited breath and engines screaming before he let off the brakes he tore down the run way and we all heaved a sigh of relief when the plane lifted off the run way with inches to spare. This may be a success story about flying but more important still it is a story about how commitment to these people and faith in their humanity will bring a better future for the generations to come.



Thank you so much for your Christmas greetings. It was good to hear from you with the help of your friend.

I am presently superior of our community here in Chester in the north-west of England. We purchased a property three years ago which was a 15 bed hotel. The property serves as our provincial it and our retirement community. We have four retired confreres. There are three African confreres, two working in the provincial office and the other working as chaplain to the local hospital. Also there is a young lady from Brazil, who is a lay associate of our congregation, involved in part-time ministry with young people and also helps out in the provincial office. Myself and another confrere in our mid 70's carry out administrative duties for the community.

However in two weeks' time I will take up the appointment as full-time RC ordained chaplain at a prison 20 miles from here. I have indicated to the provincial that I feel that I would not be able to stay on as community leader here so far he has been reluctant to appoint someone else for the job so I will see what I can do for the time being. The prisons in the UK are in a terrible state, grossly understaffed and many areas in need of repair. The 1100 prisoners in this one of whom over 300 and indicated that they are Catholics so I will have a job reconnected with some of them because there has been no traffic priest in the prison the past year.

My nephew and his girlfriend are presently working in the hospital in Hawke's Bay. Both of them are doctors and seem to be enjoying their experience. They might call on you one day if they are down in the Wellington area.

Are you managing to get out and about a little? Do you have an electric chair?

Please keep me in your prayers as I take up this new appointment. I am a little apprehensive about the whole thing but I'm sure God will give me the graces necessary. In my turn I will keep you in my prayers and ask God to bless you in the New Year we have entered.

In and through that family she was gave great service to the church, the missionary church, with her time spent in the Pacific Islands as well as Australia.



It still remains one the most memorable occasions in my life and I thank her for it and pray earnestly for the repose of the soul and the consolation for all her family and her religious community.



Patrick "Paddy" Flavin is the 1st cousin once removed of Bridget "Bridie" Sheahan








Figure 17 Bridie Sheahan (later Cox 1937-2018), Bridie Sheahan née Carr (1897-1989), Mick Flavin (1926-1981), Mick Sheahan (1931-1977), Molly Flavin née McInerney (1894-1961), Paddy Flavin (1889-1973), Leitrim Middle, Kerry, December 1950

Dear Bridie

I don't know if you would remember me well, but I was at your home with my parents John and Elizabeth and my Aunt Kay Dwyer (RIP 8 October), in April 1991. They did all the talking, and all the photography, but I kept my eyes and ears open!
I think Mum may have written to you recently, and told you of the deaths of Aunty kay and of her cousin Hazel (O'Connor) Muir, who fell while on a climbing trip?

A lot has happened to me since 1991; came to Australia to study archives in 1994, ended up at the National Library here in Canberra for a few years, moved recently to the Parliamentary Library, married Kate in 1999, Emily was born in 2000, and our second child will be born in April, DV! How's that for a quick history!?

Mum has asked me to reply to your request of 29 July for information about her uncle Morgan who was killed in France in the Great War. I am very sorry for the delay in replying—I am doing part-time studies, so I have little free time when I should not be studying. Anyway, I hope to make up for the delay by the material I am sending you.

I enclose:

- copies of the In Memoriam cards for Michael (Morgan)—Mum's uncle—and his cousin Paul
- copies of the military records for Morgan, Paul and Paul's brother Isaac (you can see when I started family history work!)

Morgan is buried in a little cemetery near the town of Albert in Somme county, France, but Paul has no known grave; his name appears on a monument near Ypres in Belgium(. I have the exact references at 'home' in Dunedin, and hope to get them in February when we make a visit there.)

The most interesting reading for you, though, will probably be the transcript of the postcards and letters from the O'Connor boys to their family during the war. I did this a few years ago, and it is much easier to read and copy than the originals. One day I may put copies of the originals on the Internet for the whole family to read...
